## October 2012

In the month of October the participants attended 4 meetings and had 3 community service events. Before every meeting we, as a group, did a check in with each other to see how everybody was doing, and then we moved into an ice-breakers activity.

### October 1, 2012

#### Community Service: Let's Move That Food!

ScOutreach participants met at the Belen Community Center to help pack and distribute food. During our time spent there we packed over 100 pounds of potatoes, sweet potatoes and onions into individual servings. Then the students helped elderly community members take their food to their cars. At the end the students helped pass out the food to the community participants. The ScOutreach students worked very hard during the community service and earned the trust of the Let's Move That Food organizers. So much that

the organizers learned the students by name and gave them special jobs during the service. This community service was very successful.



**October 9 & October 11, 2012**

**ScOutreach Meeting: Leadership and Teamwork**

At the meetings this week participants learned what qualities good leaders and team players possess by activating prior knowledge. We started off by playing *Follow The Leader*. This is a game where one leader is chosen to lead their blindfolded peers to a predetermined destination using verbal cues only. This activity showed students that the leader knew where they were going and got them there safely.

During both meetings students came up with a list of leaders they know or know of and used their occupation to come up with qualities that make them a good leader. After this activity we focused in on teamwork by acknowledging that not only is leadership an important quality so is being a good team member by listening to the leader who has a vision for where they want the group to go. Secondly we played a game called *Pyramid Cup*. Here students were asked to get into patrols to build a Styrofoam cup pyramid using only a rubber band and string contraption.

Finally, we tested the skills they learned during the lesson by asking them to build a tent using the directions we provided. We saw each student come out as a great leader during the class and they all showed great teamwork skills.



**October 13, 2012**

**Community Service: Bosque Farms Rodeo Club**

Students met at the Bosque Farms Rodeo Club to help landscape the property and paint the bleachers. Participants were able to watch the Cow Sorting competition that was happening during the entirety of the service. Students spent their time either preparing and painting the four bleachers on site or using landscape tools to weed and trim the trees on the east side of the property. Participants removed a significant amount of debris from the tree line and painted two of the four bleacher frames.



**October 23 & October 25**

**ScOutreach Meeting: How Do I Graduate from High School?**

This week students learned the specific classes and tests they need to take to graduate from high school. After we went over the high school requisites we played Jeopardy. During this game, students were not only tested on the specifics but they were made to think about the ways they will graduate and reasons they want to graduate. Participants also learned what a GPA is and how to calculate theirs.

After the jeopardy game, volunteers from Troop 253 in Bosque Farms teach the students how to build a fire safely. This included the reasons to build fire, the Outdoor Oath, and how to put out the fire safely. Both groups taught students about the specifics you need to build a fire as well as why fire safety is important. As a result of the lesson the students earned their Firem'n Chit cards.



**October 27, 2012**

**Community Service: Autumn Safety Awareness Day**

On Saturday ScOutreach participated in the VC Autumn Safety Awareness Day. We spent the day assisting various organizations with their tables. Participants: Facilitated a game with guests at the Molina Healthcare table, Passed out health pamphlets for Walgreens, Handed out chips and drinks for the concession, signed up participants for the Halloween costume contest for Big Brothers/Big Sisters, worked the front gate to greet/count/hand out lunch tickets to guests and gave out popcorn to guests at the ScOutreach table.
